Christmas Candlelight Tour

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Experience an 1820s holiday party during the Christmas Candlelight Tours at the Stephenson House on November 27 and 28 from 6-9 p.m. Take a self-guided tour, sing period carols in the parlor, learn a dance in the dining room, listen to a story or two, and then enjoy a hot cup of wassail in the kitchen during this annual event.

The rooms at the historic house are adorned with simple holiday trimmings that were known to be used during the early 19th century. "We keep it simple but that doesn't mean it's not beautiful," commented site director RoxAnn Raisner, "all of our decorations are historically correct and documented for the period. You'll not see the stereotypical Colonial Christmas though." Candles and fireplaces will be a glow during the event, adding to the cozy atmosphere.

All tours during the event are self-guided but historically dressed docents are on hand to provide information as well as answer questions. "We want visitors to feel like they are actually at the Stephenson's home for a party in the 1820s. Hopefully they feel so completely immersed in the experience they become a part of the celebration." Raisner stated. "Our site is not a typical museum experience so we've planned activities our guests can partake in; an experience for the senses." Visitors are encouraged to take up a partner and learn a simple country dance; sing a carol to

the accompaniment of an 1820 pianoforte; listen to a story of holidays past; enjoy a sweet in the kitchen; or relax next to a blazing fire.

The admission fee is \$10 for adults, \$5 for children (6-12 years), and children age 5 and under are admitted free. Hours of the event are 6:00-9:00 p.m. The 1820 Colo-

nel Benjamin Stephenson is located at 409 South Buchanan Street. Please call the Stephenson House (618) 692-1818 if you have questions or need further information. The house will not be open for tours during the day of the event or on Sunday, November 29.

SIUE's Digital Library

The internet can be a wonderful place. This past week Kathy Schmidt asked if I could do some research on Edwardsville History. When I did a Google search on the topic, the usual websites came up: local historical societies, city government, Wikipedia pages, local business pages, and Southern Illinois University Edwardsville's (SIUE) digital library. Curious, I clicked on the link for the library and discovered that the university has digitized several historical documents. These files have been uploaded to the internet and are free for everyone, not just students, to use. One of the collections, uploaded this past June, contains several encyclopedias and atlases from the late 1800s specializing in the history of different Illinois counties.

When I opened the collection, I found two books detailing the history of Madison County, Illinois: *History of Madison County, Illinois: illustrated, with biographical sketches of many prominent men and pioneers* (1882) and *Illustrated encyclopedia and atlas map of Madison County, Ill.: carefully compiled from personal examinations and surveys* (1873).

After downloading both files (they are in PDF format, like this newsletter you are reading), I was pleasantly surprised to find that the books were scanned in color and in high definition. Each page is yellowed with age and it felt like I was reading the physical copy of the book.

But the neatest part of this discovery is that both encyclopedias mention Col. Benjamin Stephenson in several different places. The books say he worked as the Receiver of Public Monies, negotiated the treaty with the Kickapoo, and that he owned the second mercantile store in the city of Edwardsville.

In addition to the information on Stephenson, the books also describe Palmon Winchester's murder trial and the scandalous reasons behind it (he allegedly killed Daniel Smith for implying that Lucy Stephenson was having an affair with Ninian Edwards).

Overall, the information about the Stephenson family in these books is nothing new. Still, it is neat to hear people

over 50 years later talk about the family and their accomplishments.

The last item of note is in the atlas portion of encyclopedias has beautiful sketches of Edwardsville from the 1870s. There are pictures of buildings from around town with horse and buggies driving by and a map of Edwardsville (as well as other local towns). Some of the landmarks depicted in them are still recognizable today.
